From The Interim Rector

Forward Together

"If everyone is moving forward together, then success takes care of itself." Henry Ford

Henry Ford, the founder of Ford Motor Company who perfected the assembly line technique for mass production, built his company around teamwork. He gathered together workers with a wide spectrum of talents and gave them a vision and a process. He also gave them an extremely competitive wage (\$5.00 per hour, revolutionary at the time). He wanted his employees to be able to afford the cars they were producing and considered this their "stake" in the company and its profits. As a result, Ford transformed the automobile from a luxury toy to a mainstay of American society. At the heart of his company's success was the ability of his workers not just to work together, but to move forward together. "If everyone is moving forward together," he said, "then success takes care of itself."

But "forward together" is more than a business strategy. In our work as the Church, it is the only way to move. God has brought us together in community, given us a vision of the kingdom and calls us to move forward together to make it so. That, in a nutshell, is why we are here.

There are two parts to "forward together." The first, of course, is "forward." As I write this, we are only a few weeks into this time of transition and, in many ways, are still getting our legs underneath us as we adapt to life without John Sutton at the helm. We have also had to re-suspend in-person worship due to the lightening-fast spread of the Omicron variant of Covid. Both of those may feel like backwards or, at best, sideways moves, but they are not. Despite, and perhaps because of these challenges we are moving forward in our understanding of who we are as a community, of worship, of why we are here, of what is important, of service, and of how we can each contribute to the mission and ministry of this place. We are moving forward in our preparation for the next leg of the journey with a new rector.

The second part of "forward together" is "together." We are on this journey as a community, and every person who is part of this community is important, valued, and necessary. Just as Henry Ford gathered together workers with a wide spectrum of gifts and talents, so has God. (Perhaps that is where Ford got the idea). We all have a stake in this place, and now is not the time for any of us to sit on the sidelines and wait to see what happens. So, I encourage each of you to discover anew how and where you would like to be a part. In my short time here I have already been amazed at the vast array of gifts and talents present here.


