From Rev. Will

Dear St. Anselm's,

Lent the word itself in Old English and Dutch as well, means spring season and while that doesn't officially start until March 19th, the buds on the plum trees, daffodils, and new growth on my rose bushes seem to suggest that spring is here already.

Since gardening has become more and more part of my life, I've been reading books and watching television shows about plants, landscaping and vegetable gardening. One thing that I found interesting was the definition of a weed, which according to one author, is any plant growing where you don't want it to be.

This reminds me of the definition of sin I recall from Sunday School, that is "anything that gets in the way of our relationship with God."

That's the invitation of Ash Wednesday and of the season of Lent as a whole, this is a time for us as individuals and as communities to deepen our relationship with the Divine --- to pause and notice the weeds, those things that have grown up in the gardens of our lives in places we did not want them and to scrape, pull, or dig them out.

Lent is also a great time, as is the season of spring, to notice those relationships, those plants, that are growing well that perhaps have even sprouted pups, that are ready for a new spot of their own, it's the season of separating bulbs so that those healthy and verdant things might have the space necessary to grow more abundantly. What activities, relationships, or practices might you embrace with greater vigor during the upcoming season of Lent?

Ash Wednesday and Lent are not lonely go it alone activities, and like gardening there's so much to be gained by connecting with people who have similar interests. Perhaps this is a season when you choose to take on a new study group, or discipline, a time for moving in a new direction or choosing in a deeper way community that enlivens and animates those things that grow your relationship with God. A few years ago I was walking on the Ohlone Greenway just down the hill from our home in El Cerrito and I was amazed by all the people utilizing the path on bikes, running, and simply strolling along, and then noticed folks working in gardens along the way, pulling weeds, and then I happened upon a man who was kicking glass off the path that someone had either intention-

From The Senior Warden

As we head toward our 2024 Annual Report and Business Meeting on 2/18, I'm amazed at how much change we have experienced in such a short a period of time and how "The Change" has affected all of us at St. Anselm's. "The Change" last fall initiated a great deal of anxiety, institutional and self-examination. It prompted many actions of which some are still in motion. At the December 18th Vestry meeting, it was determined not to elect new Vestry members at this time. Bringing new members up to speed on the key issues would be extremely difficult in the middle of this examination and healing process. Thus, the Vestry decided on December 18th to ask the Senior members (Chris Young, Elisabeth Ward, Neva Flaherty, and me) to extend our terms for up to six months. All members of the Senior class agreed. If you recall, the class before us were in the middle of a search process a year ago and did the same extension. Thus, we will hold an election of new Vestry members when feasible, but no later than the end of June.

While it is painful to reflect on what happened both personally and institutionally, it is also a lifelong belief that change forces adaptation and innovation. The more dramatic the change, the greater the response. In the days ahead and in the next few months, I pray that all of us will embrace the responses to the "The Change" we endured. For one thing, it brought us Rev. Will, a priest of Christian love who already has a deep commitment to our congregation. We appreciate and are thankful for the way he has embraced us and the wisdom and spiritual nourishment he has provided. "The Change" also forced us to restructure several old operational practices to "best practices." We are also addressing the interpersonal issues that surfaced with the hiring of a consultant and that process has just started.

In reflection, Sally & I just celebrated our 58th anniversary, 50 of those have been shared with our St. Anselm's family. We've been part of a lot of history and changes, some joyous and some painful. Throughout our years, the St. Anselm's family has been an important part of our lives. It was that warm and loving family we could return to each week over the years and it still is, in spite of all the issues we have faced. There were times when our life's changes were devastating, the deaths of parents, the kids leaving the nest to pursue their own lives, the highs and lows of business and much more. Time heals as only time can. I look forward to seeing our St. Anselm's family get through this process.

What will we become as a result of "The Change" that caught our church family by surprise? Only the future will tell. But I firmly believe things happen for a reason. I see a future of progress and deep commitment to who we were, are and always will be, a loving and welcoming community in the body of Christ.


MICHAEL LANE PRESCHOOL UPDATES

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<u>Vestry Update</u> Next Steps in Listening and Healing

Efforts continue to deepen our shared understanding of the factors and events that resulted in Rev. Stephen Siptroth's short tenure as St. Anselms' Rector in 2023. Beginning February 1, St. Anselm's has engaged Rev. Audrey Miskelley, a local Episcopal priest who specializes in leadership transitions and church healing, to work with us as a part-time external consultant. Rev. Audrey is undertaking a confidential listening process and will develop options and recommendations for Vestry consideration. Through Rev. Audrey's work we expect to gain more insight into the rifts that emerged last fall and identify actions that will help move our community forward with healing and reconciliation. Rev. Audrey's engagement is expected to extend over the next two to three months with a check-in planned for the March 17 Vestry meeting.

After church on February 4, we held a congregational listening session facilitated by Rev. Will. Because Rev. Audrey's work was barely underway, the February 4 session focused on listening, not on finding definitive explanations or unveiling solutions. The tone was pastoral, with Rev. Will and speakers expressing concern for one another and for the church community. Many church members voiced their questions, concerns, and hopes. Some offered observations and ideas about what happened and what next steps are needed. Vestry members were primarily in listening mode and appreciated the diversity of views and the commitment to St. Anselm's future that people demonstrated through their participation. Members of the Vestry took notes and will continue to reflect on implications and next steps.

The Vestry subgroup coordinating this work includes Marian Mulkey, Don Liddle and Elisabeth Ward. Questions or comments may be addressed to any one of them.

A Message From Audrey+

Hello and blessings to you, the beloved community, St. Anselm's!

I am the Rev. Audrey Miskelley and I was a classmate with Rev. Will - way back at Virginia Theological Seminary. Like many clergy my professional trajectory has gone in directions that I had not expected and yet am so grateful for. I am currently serving with Holy Cross Castro Valley, and have served numerous other congregations throughout this diocese such as St. Paul's Walnut Creek and St. Michael & All Angels Concord/St. John's Clayton - now Holy Spirit. As an "intentional interim" I work only with churches who are in the midst of transition. Therefore, I encounter people who can be anxious about what is next. Being in transition can often be uncomfortable, particularly after a long pastorate or if/when a community is experiencing a challenge that feels contrary to who you define yourselves as. As churches are a community of human beings who strive to follow God's call, that journey will encounter times when what was expected is not what transpired. My call is to help a community discover who they are especially in the midst of events that challenge. To focus on forward and what is, in fact, next.

My steadfast guide to my ministry is simple and rests in 1 John 3:2-Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when God is revealed, we will be like God, for we will see God as God is.

We know that the revelation of God is not magic, it is manifest through us - you and I - the children of God. We must ask ourselves this question: Are we manifesting God and all God's glory, or are we doing something else? This is remarkably simple and yet amazingly complicated. A lot like our life.

I will be engaging in pastoral conversations that are by their nature confidential and advising the vestry on a path forward that honors who you are as St. Anselm's but does not avoid the challenges that are important to move through and tackle with honesty and generosity.

I ask for your prayers as I hold you in my own prayers.

ally or accidentally broken right in the middle of the path covering both sides with little bits of shattered glass. His young daughter was seated in one of those nice strollers with bicycle tires, the man was clearly worried about their own tires being punctured, but also about the many others riding by whose bikes, strollers or other vehicles might be damaged by passing through those shards. His care made me want to stop and help, and for 5 minutes or so we silently stood there kicking the glass off to the sides of the path. There was something prayerful about that activity.

May Lent be a time for all of us at St. Anselm's to engage in activities and practices that deepen our relationship with the Divine, help us grow more fully alive and remove obstacles along our shared paths.


Maya Smith, Kindness Champion and Mental Health Advocate
