I don't always enjoy being "bound together in a common life." I'm an introvert and I take a lot of satisfaction in working independently. I've thoroughly internalized our culture's values around efficiency and productivity and can be impatient and judgmental about processes and people who don't

work quickly or the way I wish they would. Like many in today's contentious and polarized world, I've been known to settle into comfortable but stagnant places, thereby avoiding conflict but also limiting my opportunities to grow. Despite these tendencies, though, I keep coming back to church and to communal activities conducted by people who are, like me, flawed and messy. And more often than not, my encounters with others in these settings enrich and inspire me with "some new vision of God's truth," as the Forward Day by Day Prayer *For Today* puts it.

Our congregation has been tested over the past year. Still, when we show up together there are amazing signs of life and hope. During Lent, I heard participants in our Thursday evening discussion series share personal doubts about their own worthiness for forgiveness – and then express absolute conviction that their conversation partners were beloved and deserving despite mistakes and regrets. On Maundy Thursday, in recreating Jesus' final meal, I saw love shine through in the stories people shared around tables in Jackson Hall, in hand and foot-washing, and around the communion rail. On Easter Sunday I felt the joy of being together in communal worship.

At our April 26-28 Vestry retreat our facilitator, Rev. Audrey Miskelley, shared a David Whyte quote: "Disappointment is a friend to transformation." At the retreat I observed my fellow vestry members sharing deeply, embracing new models of leadership, imagining a vibrant future, and stepping up in a variety of ways that auger very well for St. Anselm's future. I believe that losses and disappointments of the past year have positioned our church for real transformation, the beginning stages of which are underway. You will hear much more about retreat take-aways and next steps very soon.

I am grateful to be "bound together in a common life" with all of you. It is my hope and prayer that we will increasingly experience our bonds as sources of strength and growth rather than as burdens or constraints. By showing up for one another and offering our gifts with open hearts, I believe we will find ourselves more and more bound together in the abundant life that Jesus promised.

# **Vestry Update**

The St. Anselm's Vestry spent this past weekend, April 26-28, at a remarkably positive and productive retreat at the lovely San Damiano Retreat Center in the hills above Danville. Nestled in the oak canopy, surrounding by gardens, and with views of Mount Diablo, we were close to nature and grew closer to one another in trust and in common purpose.

Rev. Audrey Miskelley, the consultant who has worked with St. Anselm's since January to assist our movement along a path of healing and reconciliation following our failed rector call, facilitated sessions on Friday evening and Saturday. With her guidance, members of the vestry's outgoing, continuing, and incoming classes spent time getting to know one another in deeper ways and building trust. We shared experiences and took stock of our many blessings; discussed in honest and hopeful ways where St. Anselm's is today; gained tools and insights about how best to lead change; and envisioned future priorities. On Sunday Rev. Will led us in a meaningful and intimate worship service and we had a brief vestry business meeting.

On May 5, vestry members will share more with the congregation, first by announcing specific (and very heartening!) next steps during our 10 a.m. service and then via informal conversations at coffee hour.

There is much work to be done in coming months, but the retreat weekend marks an important turning point, closing one chapter in the life of St. Anselm's and opening the door to its continued transformation. The vestry is very grateful for the congregation's support as we continue to deepen relationships, gain skills., and involve the entire church community in new ways in order to build a bright future.

# A message from the Starr Family

### Dear Friends:

On Sunday, May 26, 2024, we invite you to a service to celebrate the life of Alice-Jean May Starr aka "AJ", a parishioner from 2002 or so until 2023. The service will be held immediately after the regular Sunday service, and we hope you will stay for it and for refreshments afterward.

Alice-Jean May was born in New Jersey in 1920, the younger of two daughters. Her mother Jenny emigrated alone from Stavanger, Norway, at age 16, and so we know where AJ got some of her courage and will. AJ's childhood included friendships she would keep for life and the Episcopal faith. She loved sports, nature, art and music, and the exciting new field of aviation. After high school, she attended art school, held a job, took flying lessons, soloed, and kept flying. In 1942, while working as a Link Trainer (early flight simulator) instructor and operator for the US Navy, she got a telegram that changed her life: the Army Air Corps told her to report to the little Texas town of Sweetwater to be trained as a Women Airforce Service Pilot (WASP). As a WASP, AJ and 1073 of her sister pilots did every stateside job to free men for combat duty. AJ was assigned as a ferry pilot and took brand new planes from the factory to points of departure for Europe or the Pacific; her favorite plane to fly was the P-51 Mustang. She continued to fly after the war and met her husband, Theodore Starr, an aviation mechanic, back in NJ. They raised their children, Gerald and Julia, as Episcopalians. A lifetime later, we remaining Starrs are here with you to remember Alice-Jean on a day that honors those who died in service to our country, and that includes 38 WASP, one of whom was AJ's dear friend.



Please join us for coffee hour: This is AJ's particular wish. She enjoyed the fellowship and the refreshments after Sunday worship and wanted to give you a lovely spread (which we usually have anyway, so this one's gotta be good). Personal remembrances of AJ will be spoken during the coffee hour.


